


“Catchy Comments”

The water temps are up and the pollen count is down. Even the river levels are nearly back to normal after the recent deluges. It is time to get out there and get some stank on your hands. Mother Nature can only hold us down for so long. Recent data shows that the water temps near and around the CBBT are between 66 and 70 degrees. I have heard reports of some large red drum being caught on the Eastern Shore with a few nice stripers in the mix. The flounder action is starting to develop and it is only a matter of time before someone hooks into the first cobia of the season. Summertime freshwater fishing patterns will soon start to develop over the coming weeks as well. So, let that grass grow. It'll be there when you are done fishing.

If entry cards are any indication of time spent on the water, Bobby Broughton has been keeping his line wet. Bobby's first entry is for a 1 pound, 8 ounce hickory shad that he caught on April 5th from the James River. This catch on 6# spinning tackle is worth 121 points. His second entry is also for a hickory shad caught from the James River. Bobby landed this fish worth 132 points on April 6th using a spoon tied to 6# spinning tackle. But, Bobby trumped them all with his catch made from a private pond on April 20th. Bobby was casting a tube bait on 4# spinning tackle when a 20 pound, 8 ounce carp sucked up his lure. This catch earns Bobby 512 points, the “Heaviest” and “Highest Points” for the species, the title of “Freshwater Spin Division” leader, and a first place finish for “Angler of the Month” at April's meeting. Congrats Bobby! Stuart Lee was fishing the James River on April 14th with his 8# fly tackle when he landed a beauty of a white perch that weighed in at 14 ounces. This catch will earn Stuart 171 points and will stand as the current “Heaviest” and “Highest Points” catch for the species. Nice fish, Stuart! The only entries submitted to date for american shad have been made by Mickey Kodroff. Mickey was fishing North Carolina's Tar River on April 24th when he landed a 3 pound, 8 ounce shad on a dart tied to 4# spinning tackle. This fish earns Mickey 209 points and will stand as the “Heaviest” of the species to date. That same day Mickey landed a 3 pound, 0 ounce american shad worth 240 points on 2# spinning tackle. This fish will stand as the “Highest Points” for the species. Great fish, Mickey! Fred Cousins submitted the only saltwater entry for the month. Fred's entry for a 4 pound, 0 ounce flounder that he caught on May 9th from Rudee Inlet using a grub tied to 2# spinning tackle earns Fred 333 points, as well as, the “Heaviest” and “Highest Points” for the species. Great catch, Fred! David Nobles submitted the year's first entry for rainbow trout. David's 209 point trout was caught from Spring Creek

on May 4th using a Golden Retriever Fly on 4# tippet. This fish will stand as the “Heaviest” and “Highest Points” catch for the species to date. On May 6th David found himself, once again, with fly rod in hand. But, this time on the James River. On this day David was fishing a shad fly tied onto 2# tippet to catch a 1 pound, 3 ounce hickory shad worth 169 points. Nice fish, David!

THE FLOUNDER BOWL RETURNS ON JUNE 28TH

The “Flounder Bowl” is back. This year’s tournament is scheduled for June 28 with a captains meeting June 27. The tournament will be capped at 120 boats this year. Online registration is available and encouraged at www.flounderbowl.com . As this is being written, 35 spots have already been taken.

This event is a two-day party with a fishing tournament on the side. The Flounder Bowl is hosted by the Peninsula Salt Water Sport Fisherman’s Association but it is the many businesses that sponsor this event which make it such a great time. These businesses are providing a guaranteed First Place award of \$5,000. They also make it possible to provide food, drink and music for participants at both the captains meeting and at the weigh-in. The sponsors provide for team buckets given out at the captains meeting and they are also providing various prizes which will be given away at the weigh-in. Each team will find door-prize tickets in their team buckets which will give them chances to win these prizes.

The Flounder Bowl will be held out of Dare Marina and Yacht Sales (www.daremarina.com). Boats will be allowed to fish from any port but the fish must be brought to Dare Marina for weigh-in.

This is a team tournament with an entry fee of \$200 per boat with up to 4 anglers (\$125 early entry). Additional anglers will cost \$25 each. Winners will be determined by the combined weight of the team’s top three fish. Cash prizes will be paid through six places.

To give everyone a chance to win, teams not placing in the top six will be entered in a “Lucky Dog” drawing. The team drawn will win an additional cash prize.

There will be a prize for the heaviest flounder caught by a child and a prize for the heaviest flounder caught by a woman in the tournament. There will also be a prize for the heaviest flounder weighed in by a member of the Peninsula Salt Water Sport Fisherman’s Association.

Teams will be given the option of entering a “Big Fish Calcutta” for an additional \$100 entry fee. This is a 100% payout to the team that has entered the Calcutta, which weighs in the single heaviest fish.

There will be a second optional “Stringer Calcutta” with a \$100 entry fee. This is a 100% payout to the team that has entered this Calcutta, which has the heaviest stringer weight.

There is a special Sponsors’ Challenge Division where teams entered by the tournament sponsors will compete with each other for the special Sponsors’ Trophy. The winning sponsor will get to keep this trophy until next year’s tournament. Currently, the Sponsors’ Trophy is in the possession of Just Plumbing.

The 2013 Flounder Bowl had a total cash payout of \$16,750 plus sponsor donated merchandise prizes. The winnings are expected to be larger this year. This is your chance to fish with and against some of the best flounder anglers in the state. There will be food, drink, music, and multiple chances to win. Come on out and join the fun!

Catching Largemouth Bass in the Spawning Season (Part 2) (By Chris Dunnivant, VDGIF Angling Education Coordinator)

Check out the April 9 edition of The Outdoor Report for Part 1.

With our late pre-spawn areas identified, let's look at my top lure picks for this phase.

Crankbait – A shallow square bill crankbait like the Strike King KVD 1.5 or the Lucky Craft 1.5 are my go-to cranks. You can cover a lot of shallow water efficiently around a variety of cover types and water clarities. Experiment with a variety of colors, but my favorite hues have char- treuse, oranges and reds.



A variety of baits will work for pre-spawn bass, but these are my proven favorites.

Jerkbait – If the weather is warm, I pull out a floating Rattling Rogue in gold with an orange belly. This is a great search bait, meaning you can cover a lot of water with it. Bass are moving around quite a bit at this time and a technique that can intercept them as they cruise is a plus. If the weather turns cold I will pull out a suspending jerkbait like a Lucky Craft Flash Pointer 100 or 115.



Spinnerbait – This is the ultimate spring search bait because it is virtually weedless and can slide over logs and limbs and spin through aquatic vegetation. I typically go with a 3/8 oz model with Colorado and Indiana blades, but have found downsizing to a ¼ oz. bait or smaller can have great results as well. Something about a small spinnerbait this time of year really works.

Chatterbait/Bladed Jig – When first introduced less than a decade ago this bait was the rage and fish were really attacking it. However, the chatterbait has proven that it is not a fad, but a valuable tool in a bass angler's arsenal. The best colors are green pumpkin or black/blue flake, but the spinnerbait standard chartreuse and white can also be effective. Reel it through and around cover, much like a spinnerbait retrieve.

Jig – A 3/8 oz model in black and blue or green pumpkin/natural hues, depending on water clarity, are your best choices. Match it with a plastic chunk or craw trailer and swim it through cover for a stealthier, subtle approach than a spinnerbait or bladed jig. When the bass are sluggish or the weather turns cool, fish it slowly along the bottom around docks, laydowns and grass lines.

Spawn

Once fish are committed to the spawn, soft plastics dominate. Fast moving baits like spinnerbaits, crankbaits and jerkbaits may work well in the early morning hours or on cloudy days, but experience and tournament results reveal that a soft plastic lure is the top choice. I recall a day in early May on Lake Chesdin, prime spawning time, where a friend and I were both on the lake in separate boats. It was bright and sunny and the wind was blowing. He fished windy banks with a crankbait and had limited success. I fished calmer pockets and grass edges with a watermelonseed trick worm on a flick-shake head and caught a nice limit of bass weighing almost 20 pounds with several fish between 4-5 pounds.

Largemouth bass primarily spawn in very shallow water, just a couple of feet deep, but this can vary depending on water clarity. The clearer the water, the better the light penetration to incubate the eggs, the deeper the bass will make their nests.

Blind casting to spawning areas can be very effective if fish are aggressive, but more times than not it requires patience and repeated casts to a bed in order to entice the bass to bite. Bass will likely build their nests near some type of cover: a stump, a corner of a dock, a laydown tree, or a hole in some vegetation.

A variety of soft plastics will work fished weightless or on the bottom. Visit the upcoming Fishing Spot for Part 3 in the next edition of The Outdoor Report where we will cover my favorite spawning baits: Senkos, Trick Worms, creature baits and tubes and also; catching bass in the post spawn phase.


