Angling Rule Change - Carter Clevinger

There has been a change in IGFA rules.

IGFA World Record Categories

General Information

IGFA maintains world records for both freshwater and saltwater game fish in All-Tackle, All-Tackle Length, Line Class, Tippet Class and Junior and Smallfry categories. In order to qualify for a record, a catch must be a minimum of .453 kilograms (1 pound) in weight, and must outweigh the existing record by the required amount or meet the minimum weight requirement for vacant records.

No applications will be accepted for fish caught in hatchery waters, sanctuaries or small bodies of water that are stocked with fish for commercial purposes. The intent of this rule shall prevail and IGFA retains the right to determine its applicability on a case-by-case basis. The catch must not be at variance with any laws or regulations governing recreational catch or harvest of the species or waters in which it is caught.

VA General Assembly nixes MENHADEN study bill

Virginia's General Assembly has killed legislation to address the declining menhaden population.

The tiny forage fish are an important part of the food chain for sea life and a source of nutrients for people. The bill would have authorized a study of the reduction in menhaden across the Chesapeake Bay. A version of the bill last year was watered down to form only a study methodology.

Jaclyn Higgins, forage fish program manager for the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership, said along with ecological effects, the study would have focused on commercial fishing's effects.

"They were going to look at different impacts, like effort patterns," Higgins explained. "Where the more concentrated effort of the menhaden reduction industry is within the bay, if that contributes to localized depletion of menhaden in the Chesapeake Bay during the season."

The study would also have included economic impacts. Although the bill failed, two others are moving swiftly. Both would provide special protections for commercial fishing vessels, even for industrial menhaden boats. These are being met with opposition, since they could lead to even lower menhaden populations in the bay.

Chris Dollar, owner of Tackle Cove Sport Fishing, thinks the study should go forward, since it is designed to be a fair assessment of menhaden populations.

"Let the VIMS scientists, Virginia Institute of Marine Sciences, do their work,"
Dollar urged. "Do the sound science that will fill in the knowledge gaps about whether or not menhaden populations are at a level that can sustain the industrial harvest."

Other actions are being taken to fight for menhaden. Last May, the Chesapeake Legal Alliance filed a lawsuit challenging the Virginia Marine Resources Commission's standards on menhaden harvesting. The proposed regulations would have pushed the operations away from the shores of Chesapeake Bay with the hope of preventing net spills.

Without action, supporters argued, it is business as usual but unsustainable, as recent surveys find young menhaden populations are dwindling.

Chris Moore, Virginia executive director of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, said the science can inform the state's decisions and goals.

"First of all, we have a healthy population of menhaden in Chesapeake Bay, especially in the face of climate change," Moore pointed out. "Once we're sure that we have that, we can appropriately size our fisheries."

Last year, several groups signed a letter to Gov. Glenn Youngkin calling for menhaden operations to be moved out of Chesapeake Bay, to help protect the ecosystem.

Friends -

I'm sending this email not as a member of both the Virginia Anglers Club and Virginia Saltwater Sportfishing Assoc., and by no stretch of the imagination am I a lobbyist (scary thought); I'm simply one of thousands of business owners whose livelihood depends on unfettered access to the Bay and healthy fisheries.

Likely backed by the Menhaden industrialized reduction fishery, two bills that could arguably be called "Omega Protection bills" are moving very fast through Virginia's General Assembly, apparently. They are HB 928 Interference with Commercial Fishing Vessel (Hillary Kent) and a similar HB 1465 (Rob Bloxom).

Contact your elected representatives and voice your strong opposition to both of these "Omega Protection bills." Not only do they run counter to Gov. Youngkin's stated policy of no new regulations – esp. unwarranted ones – reasonable and enforceable laws against onwater harassment are already on the books at both the state and federal levels.

The proposed bills are nothing more than a solution in search of problems and would likely stretch thin marine law enforcement unnecessarily. It is also perhaps another not-so-veiled attempt by the industry's lobbyists to intimidate recreational anglers and boaters who are exercising their right to enjoy the public resources of Chesapeake Bay that our tax dollars pay to conserve and rebuild.

Alexandria, VA – Last week, after months of public hearings, the ASMFC's ATLANTIC STRIPED BASS Management Board (Board) met to finalize Addendum II which contains management changes for the 2024 striped bass season. Action on Addendum II follows a May 2023 decision where the Board voted 15-1 to evoke emergency action to address rising fishing mortality rates resulting from increased catches in 2022. However, last week, Board deliberations on questions like recreational mode splits (granting for-hire operators a different bag and/or size limit) and commercial quota reductions were less decisive. Mode splits were an especially challenging question because recreational regulations for other targeted species like black sea bass and scup continue to get more restrictive despite those populations being 200% of their biomass targets, creating an economic squeeze on the entire recreational fishing industry and particularly the for-hire operators.

Ultimately, the Board approved the following options, most by a thin majority, including:

- A one-fish bag limit with a slot of 19-24 inches in Chesapeake Bay and 28-31 inches in the ocean recreational fishery.
- No mode splits, meaning private, shore and for-hire anglers adhere to the same regulation.
- A 7% reduction to commercial quotas in Chesapeake Bay and ocean fisheries.
- Empowering the Board to act if the 2024 stock assessment shows rebuilding is off schedule.

"Anglers submitted thousands of comments, so it was a stressful meeting as the Board prioritizes conservation resulting in real economic consequences to our community," said Mike Waine, Atlantic Fisheries Policy Director for the American Sportfishing Association. "The Board chose options that continue to address fishing mortality, but these were labored discussions that demonstrate the Board struggling to balance the needs of the recreational fishing community while achieving current conservation goals."

"The striped bass board reacted to public input and the harsh reality of the overall stock condition to make some difficult yet necessary decisions to cut fishing mortality for the 2024 season." said David Sikorski, CCA Maryland Executive Director and ASMFC Commissioner. "Unfortunately, these actions are simply a next step in what will likely be a series of more difficult decisions to come."

"When popular fisheries are depleted, whether driven by environmental stressors, harvest, or some combination of the two, difficult decisions often have to be made," said Chris Horton, Senior Director of Fisheries Policy for the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation. "Fishing effort is the only thing the ASMFC can directly control, and it was the right choice to apply conservation measures equally across the board as all anglers play the same role in rebuilding this incredibly important fishery."

In October, the Board will review results from the 2024 stock assessment that will provide additional rebuilding projections and evaluate fishing mortality through 2023. In the meantime, a subset of the Board members will be working with stakeholders to explore discard mortality, including challenges the Board has faced in addressing dead discards and possible solutions moving forward.

Conservation-Minded Virginians Call for Hickory Shad Protections

The Issue: Hickory shad is an anadromous fish that lives mostly in the Atlantic Ocean and returns to the Chesapeake Bay's rivers and streams to spawn. Along with American shad, they were once an abundant and important commercial species. Today, both shads are listed as depleted by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission. As one of the first migrating game fish available to Chesapeake sport anglers in the early spring, they are important to and valued by the Bay's recreational fishing community. Unlike American shad, currently there are no conservation protections in place for hickory shad in Virginia waters of the Chesapeake Bay and its coastal rivers and their tributaries. There are no limits on the size or number of hickory shad an angler can take from these waters. There are also no restrictions on the type of gear one can use to catch them.

Hickory shad, however, are fully protected in Maryland and District of Columbia waters, and there is a ten-fish daily bag limit in North Carolina (though no size limit) and selected Virginia rivers beyond the Chesapeake Bay watershed. This is concerning because unrestricted catches in Virginia's coastal rivers threaten progress made to protect and restore both shad species, which are also forage for striped bass and other Bay game fish.

The Solution: Alarmed by this threat to the important fishery, CCA Virginia has been working to remedy this situation with little success. In early February 2024 the organization submitted a formal petition for rulemaking to the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) requesting that the Commission consider reasonable harvest regulations for hickory shad in Virginia waters under its jurisdiction. This fisheries management adjustment will help ensure a quality recreational fishery, streamline VMRC's regulatory oversight, and be more consistent with shad and herring restoration plans.

CCA & Partners Kickstart Rebuilding Fishing Reefs in Virginia's Chesapeake Bay

Coastal Conservation Association Virginia (CCA Virginia) and Coastal Conservation Association Maryland (CCA Maryland) recently teamed up with the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) to add more than 24 tons of reef material to the Gwynn's Island Artificial Reef Site, located just south of the Piankatank River on the western shore of Chesapeake Bay.

On a brisk winter's day, a barge loaded with 54 reef balls and 250 pyramids was met by the VMRC's artificial fishing reef crew to place the materials at the permitted site, a once popular fishing reef that had not received any new material in many years. The reef balls were built at Tackle Cove Outfitters on Virginia's Northern Neck in the fall of 2023 by students from Chesapeake Academy, CCA Virginia members and other community volunteers. The concrete pyramids were made and donated by Kinsley Construction in York, PA and, through a partnership with the Ocean City Reef Foundation and Capt. Monty Hawkins, were provided to CCA Virginia for use on the Gwynn's Island reef.

The project is another habitat rebuilding effort undertaken by the "Living Reef Action Campaign (LRAC)," CCA's flagship habitat and education program in the Chesapeake region. Since 2015, LRAC has engaged thousands of students and community members in hands-on experiences that inspire stewardship of public marine resources.

Capt. Chris D. Dollar, CCA Senior Advisor for the Chesapeake Region, issued this statement:

"CCA Virginia is committed to <u>revitalizing fish habitat</u> that helps improve recreational fishing in the Commonwealth. Chesapeake anglers are exceptional stewards of our marine resources and are eager to help advance habitat restoration in the Bay, and the Gwynn's Island project is hopefully the first of many projects we will do with VMRC and our partners."

1) **PERCH TOURNAMENT** - 2/17/24 to 3/2/24

Electronic card submissions must be turned in no later than Tuesday March 5th. A \$25 Green Top gift card will be awarded to the winners. A single person is eligible to win both prizes but it must be done with two separate fish submissions. In the event of a tie, the first fish caught will be the winner. A third prize (\$25 gift card) will be awarded to the highest point fish, non-yellow perch, card submitted that was caught during the tournament dates while fishing for yellow perch. 2) **SHAD TOURNAMENT** - 3/30/24 to 4/14/24

The Virginia Anglers Club will be hosting a Hickory Shad Fishing Tournament open to all 2024 VAC Club members in good standing. All Tournament entries will be in compliance with local regulations and caught from the James River starting on March 30th up and including April 14th. 
